

CALL FOR ABSTRACTS NOW OPEN

Deadline: Friday 21st February 2025

We are now accepting abstracts on any aspect of the ectodermal dysplasias for this truly multidisciplinary conference. We anticipate that most will be accepted as posters, but a spoken presentation may be possible. We will inform authors of our decisions two weeks after the submission deadline.

We especially encourage trainees to submit abstracts. There will be a poster presentation session and a prize for the best poster or spoken presentation from a trainee. There will also be many opportunities to view and discuss posters throughout the conference.

Abstract Requirements

Format: MS Word document of two pages.

On the first page, please include:

List all authors in order with full name, title, affiliation, address, status (job title) and email address for each. Please indicate corresponding author.

State whether poster or spoken presentation is preferred (all will be considered for both, but most accepted abstracts will be presented as posters).

On the second page, please state the title and set out the abstract with a maximum of 250 words in the body of the text (excluding title and references) and with no identifying information (names or location). We will review the abstracts 'blinded' as to your identity. References are permitted but not required; they should not be identified as referring to your own work.

Please use Calibri font at 14 point in an MS-Word document with generous margins and line spacing set at 1.15.

We suggest that you structure the format with four headings (Introduction, Methods, Findings and Conclusion) but you can modify this when appropriate.

Please send the abstract as an email attachment to Prof Angus Clarke, chair of the Scientific Programme Committee: clarkeaj@cardiff.ac.uk

The email must contain statements (i) that all co-authors have approved the submission, (ii) that any research conducted on animals or human subjects has been conducted in accord with the Declaration of Helsinki and with the approval of the appropriate local, national or institutional ethics committee, (iii) that you have full consent to present any identifying personal information that may appear, and (iv) that declare whether there are any apparent or potential conflicts of interest.

The scientific content of the poster need not be novel but, if not novel, the email should make clear when and where the content has been presented before.
